IDENTIFYING AND DEVELOPING YOUR GIFTS 3

SPIRITUAL GIFTS QUESTIONAIRE AND DEFINITIONS

The **Spiritual Gifts Questionnaire** is an exercise to help you begin to identify your individual spiritual gifts. It will work best for you if you are completely honest in your answers. Put the answer that you really feel and not what you think you should feel or what you think other people think you should feel or do. This exercise is for you, not for other people.

Here is how to do it:

STEP I	Go through the list of 125 statements in the questionnaire. For each one, mark to
	what extent the statement is true of your life: MUCH (3) SOME (2), LITTLE (1),
	or NOT AT ALL (0).

When you are finished, score the questionnaire by means of the Score Chart. You will find a pattern of strengths (indicated by high scores) as you evaluate your scores. This will help you identify gifts and strengths that are in your life now.

STEP III We will be teaching and giving practical information on the various spiritual gifts and how they can function and operate in your life.

SPECIAL NOTE: READ THIS CAREFULLY

This questionnaire is just a starting place in helping you to discover the spiritual gifts God has given you. Do not make the mistake of considering the results to be final and irrefutable. It may even be that a gift you actually have does not show strongly here. Use this tool as a helpful source of insight, but don't let its results control you.

Your Calling, Spiritual Gifts, and Ministry Potential are not limited to the giftings identified by this or any other Assessment Questionnaire. This is only a beginning and a guideline to help you get started.

As you grow and mature and as God's purpose for your life becomes progressively clearer, you may add to your "Tool Box" of giftings through desire and prayer, through revelation or prophecy, and through necessity and practical experience.

IDENTIFYING AND DEVELOPING YOUR GIFTS 3A SPIRITUAL GIFT DEFINITIONS

A. **Prophecy, Perceiving**: The God-given ability to present truth. A persuasiveness and power in speech which brings to light things previously concealed. The ability to supernaturally convey God's message for the moment in the language of speaker and hearers. The gift of directing vision toward matters of vital concern in relation to immediate goals. This gift can be used for the purpose of elevating spiritual vision in the Body of Christ.

Cautions:

- a. Proud of rhetoric or persuasive speech.
- b. Dependent on ability to speak rather than on the Holy Spirit to convict.
- c. Seeing people as groups; not as individuals.
- d. Judgmental and a sharp tongue without love.
- e. Interjecting personal feelings.
- f. Extending the ministry beyond limits. (Personal and Scriptural).
- g. Attempting to move people by demand rather than love.
- h. Public boldness and strict standard may hinder close personal relationships.

Scriptures:

1 Corinthians 12:10, 28; Ephesians 4:11-14; Romans 12:6; Luke 7:26; Acts 15:32, Acts 21:9-11

B. **Shepherding, Pastor, Caring:** The gift of being a shepherd and carer to the flock of God. The special ability that God gives to assume a long-term personal responsibility for the spiritual welfare of a group of believers. The function of the Pastor gift is primarily to lead and feed. This gift can be used for the purpose of developing a group of believers into spiritual maturity. Not necessarily a strong leader.

Cautions:

- a. Seeing only the needs of the local fellowship.
- b. Attempting to meet every need by personal effort.
- c. Allowing unhealthy dependency to develop. Must let people grow up.
- d. Losing sight of the importance of evangelism and outreach.

Scriptures: Ephesians 4:11-14; 1 Timothy 3:1-7; John 10:1-18; 1 Peter 5:1-3

C. **Teaching, Teacher**: Teaching or clarifying truth by ensuring the accuracy of context, etc. An ability to research and unearth facts from Scripture. This involves diligence, fervency in study and careful research. The gift of being able to expound the truths of God's Word in context and to make profound truths simple. This gift can be used for the purpose of edifying the Body of Christ in relations to the basic concepts of successful Christian living.

Cautions:

- a. Boasting of knowledge one has accumulated.
- b. Concentration on details rather than principles
- c. Captivated by research rather than responses.
- d. Believing truth is discerned through intellect.
- e. Expounding truth without applying principles.
- f. Becoming more interested in principles than people.

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Scriptures: 1 Corinthians 12:28; Ephesians 4:11-14; Romans 12:7; Acts 18:24-28, Acts 20:20-

D. **Wisdom:** A supernatural revelation showing how to apply the right solution. Insight into how given knowledge may best be applied to specific needs arising in the body of Christ. Used to supernaturally impart to someone the right procedures to take in a difficult situation.

Cautions: a. Over-dependency on gifts.

b. Lack of prayer and spiritual exercises.

c. Becoming a "spiritual guru."

Scriptures: 1 Corinthians 2:1-13, 12:8; Acts 6:3, 10; James 1:5-6; 2 Peter 3:15

E. **Knowledge:** A supernatural revelation to meet an emergency or crisis. Used to supernaturally impart to a person or group a fact of knowledge which at that moment is otherwise unknown. Can reveal details about a person or situation.

Cautions: a. Hesitancy in communicating due to no logical explanation.

b. Failure to exercise reason. Avoid jumping to conclusions.

c. Developing a "fortune-teller" attitude.

Scriptures: 1 Corinthians 2:14, 12:8; Acts 5:1-11; Colossians 2:2-3; 2 Corinthians 11:6

F. **Encouragement, Exhortation**: Stimulating the faith of others in specific action toward definite goals. The special ability to minister words of comfort, consolation, encouragement, and counsel to other members of the body in such a way that they feel helped and healed. An ability to counsel others and encourage them toward spiritual growth.

Cautions: a. Boasting about personal results.

b. Discouraged when progress is slow.

c. Indiscretion in sharing results.

d. Giving too much time to the wrong people.

e. Emphasis on steps of action appear to over simplify problem and disregard feelings

Scriptures: Romans 12:8; 1 Timothy 4:13; 2 Timothy 4:2; Hebrews 10:25; Acts 14:22

G. **Discernment:** The supernatural ability to discern the source of spiritual manifestations; to know with assurance whether certain behavior purported to be of God is in reality divine, human, or satanic. Used to detect the presence of evil spirits or to examine the source of a manifestation which is dubious. Ability to discern between truth and error.

Cautions: a. Seeing the problem not the person

b. Acting harshly -- not firmly.

c. Developing a critical attitude.

d. Becoming "God's Policeman."

Scriptures: 1 Corinthians 12:10; Acts 5:1-11; Acts 16:16-18; 1 John 4:1-6; Matthew 16:21-23

H. **Giving**: Giving or joyfully entrusting personal assets or possessions to others for the work of the ministry. An ability to organize personal business; able to wisely invest and make quick and sound decisions about the right use of money.

Cautions: a. Becoming proud of one's generosity.

- b. Measuring spiritual success by material gain.
- c. Attempting to buy influence with money.
- d. Overlooking long range goals.
- e. Being "used" by unprincipled ministries.

Scriptures: Romans 12:8; 2 Corinthians 8:1-7; 2 Corinthians 9:2-8

I. **Helps:** The gift of helps is the special ability that God gives to certain members of the body of Christ to invest the talents they have in the life and ministry of other members of the body, thus enabling those others to increase the effectiveness of their own spiritual gifts.

Cautions: a. Becoming caught up in details and losing sight of Jesus.

b. Danger of burnout.

c. Being judgmental of others who serve in different ways.

Scriptures: 1 Corinthians 12:28; Romans 16:1-2; Acts 9:36; Luke 8:2-3 with Mark 15:40-41

J. **Mercy**: Empathizing by a God-given ability to identify with and comfort those in distress. An ability to sympathize deeply with the misfortunes of others; mentally and emotionally relating and giving aid. An ability to translate compassion into cheerfully done deeds which reflect Christ's love and alleviate suffering.

Cautions: a. Proud of ability to sympathize.

- b. Resenting others who are not sympathetic to needs.
- c. Taking up the offenses of others.
- d. Failing to be firm -- guided by emotions, not reason.

Scriptures: Romans 12:8; Mark 9:41; Acts 16:33-34; Luke 10:33-35; Matthew 20:29-34, Matthew 25:34-40; Acts 11:28-30

K. Missionary: The gift of missionary is the special ability that God gives to certain members of the body of Christ to minister whatever other spiritual gifts they have in a second culture. The ability to live and flourish in a culture or geographic location different from the one in which they were born. The grace to leave family, familiarity, and security and trust God for provision, protection, and position.

Cautions: a. The danger of "going native."

- b. Must not become judgmental of others who don't "go."
- c. Must have other gifts that give purpose. It is not a stand-alone gift.

Scriptures: 1 Corinthians 9:19-23, Acts 8:4, Acts 13:2-3, Acts 22:21

L. **Evangelism:** The gift of being able to point men and women to a saving knowledge of the Lord

Jesus Christ. This gift can be used for the purpose of attracting people to salvation in Christ. May not be a "preacher." Some times the most effective use of this gift is one-to-one. May be used to stir up and equip the body of Christ to evangelism.

Cautions: a. Must not become judgmental of others who do not have this gift.

- b. Must recognize the importance of follow-up and nurture.
- c. Needs to be part of a team.
- d. Danger of pride in success.

Scriptures: Ephesians 4:11-14; 2 Timothy 4:5; Acts 8:26-40, Acts 14:21, Acts 21:8

M. **Hospitality**: The gift of hospitality is the special ability that God gives to certain members of the body of Christ to provide an open house and a warm welcome to those in need of food and lodging.

Cautions: a. One's own family can suffer if not handled properly.

b. Can make others feel inadequate if they don't do as much.

Scriptures: 1 Peter 4:9; Romans 12:9-13, Romans 16:23; Acts 16:14-15; Hebrews 13:1-2

N. **Faith**: The supernatural ability to visualize and witness spiritual achievement. Used to supernaturally empower a person to "believe" beyond their own natural faith. The ability to see the Lord's will and act on it with unwavering belief in God's ability.

Cautions: a. Fear of being proved wrong.

- b. Ignoring others' feelings.
- c. Impatient with others who do not have this gift.
- d. Must not be presumptuous.

Scriptures: 1 Corinthians 12:9; Acts 11:22-24, Acts 27:21-25; Hebrews 11; Romans 4:18-21

O. **Leadership**: Ruling or co-ordinating the activities of others for the achievement of a common goal. An ability to preside or lead; seeing future consequences of one's action; able to distinguish major objectives and help others visualize them.

Cautions: a. Proud of power over people.

- b. Using people to accomplish goals.
- c. Overlooking character faults in those who can be useful to reaching goals.
- d. The ability to delegate may appear as laziness.

Scriptures: 1 Timothy 5:17; Acts 7:10, Acts 15:7-11; Romans 12:8; Hebrews 13:17

P. **Administration:** The gift of administration is the special ability that God gives to certain members of the body of Christ to understand clearly the immediate and long-range goals of a particular unit of the body of Christ and to devise and execute effective plans for the accomplishment of those goals.

Cautions: a. Becoming caught up in details and organization.

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b. Need to give freedom to those given responsibility.

Scriptures: 1 Corinthians 12:28; Acts 6:1-7; Acts 27:11; Luke 14:28-30

Q. **Miracles:** The supernatural ability to suspend natural laws. Used to bring God's power to bear upon situations where natural means fail.

Cautions: a. Pride in experience.

b. Lack of prayer and devotion.

Scriptures: 1 Corinthians 12:10,28; Acts 9:36-42, Acts 19:11-20, Acts 20:7-12; Romans 15:18-

19; 2 Corinthians 12:12

R. **Healing**: The supernatural ability to bring God's healing power to the sick. Used to bring deliverance to those bound with disease, infirmity, affliction, etc. May be somewhat "specialized," more effective with certain kinds of illness or disease.

Cautions: a. Moving on one's own initiative.

b. Failing to develop sensitivity.

Scriptures: 1 Corinthians 12:9, 28; Acts 3:1-10, Acts 5:12-16, Acts 9:32-35, Acts 28:7-10

S. **Tongues:** The special ability to speak to God in a language one has never learned and/or to receive and communicate an immediate message of God to his people through a divinely-anointed utterance in a language one has never learned. Used in congregational worship to bring a message from God or privately as a devotional exercise.

Cautions: a. Regarding "tongues" as a mark of maturity.

b. Proud of the prominence the gift inevitably brings.

Scriptures: 1 Corinthians 12:10,28, 1 Corinthians 14:13-19; Acts 2:1-13, Acts 10:44-46, Acts

19:1-7; Mark 16:17

T. **Interpretation**: The ability to supernaturally interpret a message in tongues. Used to interpret the Mind of the Spirit as given through a message in other tongues.

Cautions: a. Dependency on one's own initiative.

b. Over-zealousness and failing to develop sensitivity.

Scriptures: 1 Corinthians 12:10, 30, 1 Corinthians 14:13, 26-28

U. **Apostleship:** The gift of pioneering new territory for the Gospel of Christ (a modern missionary. A church-planter. A pioneer or foundation-layer). This gift can be used for the express purpose of making major in-roads with the Gospel message. Has an authority in spiritual matters which is spontaneously recognized and appreciated by others.

Cautions: a. Holding attention by virtue of one's position.

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b. Being proud because of personal selection.

c. Allowing a ministerial hierarchy to develop around apostolic gift.

Scriptures: 1 Corinthians 12:28; 2 Corinthians 12:12; Ephesians 4:11-14, 3:1-9; Acts 15:1-2;

Galatians 2:7-10

٧. **Celibacy**: The gift of celibacy is the special ability that God gives to certain members of the body of Christ to remain single and enjoy it; to be unmarried and not suffer undue sexual temptations.

Cautions: a. Putting the same expectations on other people.

b. Being proud of the gift God has given.

c. Becoming a loner.

1 Corinthians 7:7-8; Matthew 19:10-12 Scriptures:

W. **Intercession:** The gift of intercession is the special ability that God gives to certain members of the body of Christ to pray for extended periods of time on a regular basis and see frequent and specific answers to their prayers, to a degree much greater than that which is expected of the average Christian.

Cautions: a. Expecting other people to pray as much and as fervently.

b. Discouragement at lack of response of others to times of prayer.

c. Lack of appreciation for other gifts which seem less spiritual.

James 5:14-16; 1 Timothy 2:1-2; Colossians 1:9-12, Colossians 4:12-13; Acts Scriptures:

12:12; Luke 22:41-44

X. **Martyrdom**: The gift of martyrdom is the special ability that God gives to certain members of the body of Christ to undergo suffering for the faith even to the point of death, while consistently displaying a joyous and victorious attitude which brings glory to God.

Cautions: a. Bringing abuse on oneself by an abrasive attitude or behavior

b. Setting oneself apart from others by being hyper-spiritual

1 Corinthians 13:3; Acts 5:27-41, Acts 7:54-60, Acts 12:1-5, 2 Corinthians 11:21-Scriptures:

30, 12:9-10

Service: Serving or demonstrating love by meeting practical needs so that others can be freed for Υ. service. An ability to detect personal needs; to overlook personal comfort so that the needs of others can be met.

Cautions: a. Proud of good deeds.

> b. Pushy or premature in attempting to meet the needs of others before they themselves realize what those needs are.

c. Bitter when good deeds are not appreciated.

d. Over emphasis on practical -- neglect of spiritual.
